

		until the Tenor part is learned. The Bari is taught last as it is the most

		difficult part. As outlined with the teaching of the other three parts, the Lead, Bass, and Tenor sing along quietly until the Bari part is learned. The Bari part is learned much quicker because of the well established implied harmonies of the other three parts previously sung. This teaching process
		allows the parts to be thoroughly learned and helps the singers from forgetting their part while the other parts are being taught.
		When teaching the Lead/Bass, hand gestures are used on the word "beau - $ti - ful - ul$ " to indicate the Tenor/Bari moving parts. When teaching the Lead, Bass, and Tenor parts, hand gestures are used on the final word "me" to indicated there is an extra move or beat to allow for the Bari
		suspension. It is helpful to note to the singers, the unison octave on the word "to".
