Composer and/or Music & Lyricist, and Year	"Black Is the Colour (of My True Love's Hair)" (Roud 3103) is a traditional folk song first known in the Appalachian Mountains region of the United States in 1915, but most probably originating from Scotland, as attributed to the reference to the Clyde in the song's lyrics. The musicologist Alan Lomax supported this Scottish origin saying the song was an American "re-make of British materials." The first recording was made by Mrs. Lizzie Roberts in 1916 as "Black Is The Colour". 6.	<b>TagAnalysis Summary</b>	This is a beautiful minor sounding Tag with a familiar melody and words, the Tag is short, and has simple, easy individual parts to learn. This is modern Tag with a beautiful major seventh chord on the third word "black", a surprise 9 <sup>th</sup> chord on the word "true", and another pleasing and surprising dominant 7 chord on the word "loves" then finally, going into a Picardy 3 <sup>rd</sup> tonic A.

Once the Lead part has been learned, teach the Bass part next with the Lead quietly singing along in the background; the Bass provides the foundation and have many consonant intervals with the Lead. When the

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		Bass part has been learned, teach the Tenor part with the Lead and Bass quietly singing along. Then teach the Bari part with the other three parts quietly singing in the background; the Bari is taught last because of the dissonance created between the Tenor/Bari on "color" and the major 2 <sup>nd</sup> between the Lead/Bass. This teaching process allows parts to rehearse their part and not forget their part as others are learning their part.

Not only do we have the ninth interval between the Tenor and Bass, we also have a major seventh interval between the Tenor and Bari; this makes for a very colorful chord that is very fitting for the word "color".</li> <li>3. The word "true", a G 9 chord; from the bottom up, G, A, B, D.</li> <li>4. A dominant G<sup>7</sup> chord on the word "loves".</li> </ol>
